From the Trustees

The **special assessment project** at the pool was completed in May. Several improvements were made.

- Wall returns were installed.
- Floor returns were sealed.
- •New underwater LED lights were installed.
- New gutter lines were installed in 75% of the pool. The section to the right of the diving board and along lane six by the guard stand was not replaced.

We've made some great improvements

Painting the gutters was not in the original estimate and was not completed in this phase of the work. However, this will be scheduled in the future.

The **original estimated cost** for the project was \$160,802. The final cost was \$171,797.60.

Thank you to all the residents who supported the special assessment! Our pool is a valuable asset to our neighborhood. Many families have spent countless hours enjoying it and many more will continue to make memories for years to come. **The trustees appreciate your support to help maintain our pool.** The pool is one of the many things that makes Seven Pines a great place to live!

What to Do in the Garden in July

Here are six things you will want to do in your garden in July. More information can be found at https://www.thompson-morgan.com/

- 1. Water at dusk to reduce evaporation and use mulch to retain moisture around plants.
- 2. Terracotta pots are prone to evaporation so dampen the pot down to keep roots inside cool and damp.
- 3. Regularly deadhead bedding and perennial plants to encourage new blooms.
- 4. Cut back faded perennial plants to keep borders tidy.
- 5. Cutting back growth in hanging baskets can encourage new flowers and foliage and will revive the display. Make sure you feed your baskets well after doing this.
- 6. This is your last chance to feed your lawn with a special lawn fertilizer to encourage healthy green growth. Water newly seeded or turfed lawns in hot weather. Don't allow new lawns to dry out.

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Review of: Lady Tan's Circle of Women by Lisa See



This is our 2nd Lisa See novel, the first one being *Snow Flower and the Secret Fan*, and she doesn't disappoint. This historical novel is inspired by the true story of a **woman physician** in 15th-century China who wrote a book about her life and it is still available today in English. Lee weaves in a wealth of information about Chinese culture from this source as she imagines what life would be like for women in1469.

See's explanation of the **practice of foot binding** and its complications is nothing short of horrifying. Successful foot

binding actually dictates what kind of future a young girl will have starting at about age 5. To be clear, foot binding involves breaking and tightly binding the feet of young girls to change their shape and size. The practice continued until the establishment of the Peoples Republic of China in 1949.



In 1469 there were many cultural practices that would seem very strange today. For one, doctors were not allowed to look at or touch their female patients, so midwives were in common use as doctors really knew very little about childbirth. The mothers practiced the medical technique of variolation, a form of early vaccination, against smallpox just as we vaccinate against early childhood diseases today. The wealthy women were not allowed to see the outer world and were schooled from an early age of the importance of lessons in etiquettes, and the roles and responsibilities of women. Tan also details a public autopsy of a murder victim to determine the cause of death.

Another topic is the **relationship among the women** who all live together in the large family compound. Obviously, there are the concubines (brought into the household for the amusement of the husband), but the most important friendship is the one formed among the supportive and nurturing women who live there. The bond of female relationships takes center stage in this novel.

Menu: Our host went full out Chinese cuisine. We started with a sampling of egg rolls, spring rolls, pot stickers, and Crab Rangoon. Our main entrée was fried rice, grilled pork tenderloin, and Chinese slaw. A favorite Chinese dessert, tapioca pudding, topped with fresh whipped cream, came next. What a delicious experience!

"Still Life with Woodpecker is a sort of a love story that takes place inside a pack of Camel cigarettes. It reveals the purpose of the moon, explains the difference between criminals and outlaws, examines the conflict between social activism and romantic individualism, and paints a portrait of contemporary society that includes powerful Arabs, exiled royalty, and pregnant cheerleaders. 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SPIA MEETING MINUTES



The **SPIA** meeting was held at the Pool on Monday, June 16th. President Emily Sallade started the meeting at 7:02.

The minutes from the previous meeting were approved as published in the *Flashes*.

The **Treasurer report** from Tom Wilde Treasurer. From the Seven Pines Trustees

Just a friendly reminder that the subdivision indenture of trust and subdivision rules and regulations require approval for some home improvements or changes you might make.

Architectural Changes that Require Trustee Approval

- New fences or replacement fences that are not placed on the existing fence line
- Sheds and utility buildings
- Gazebos
- Decks

Architectural Changes that do NOT Require Trustee Approval

- Changing color of siding, shutters, or doors
- Changing driveway from asphalt to concrete, or vice versa
- New windows or doors

- Patios and pavers
- Retaining walls
- Swimming pools
- Additions to your home
- Additions to your driveway
- Replacement of existing non-cyclone (chain-link) fencing on the same fence line
- Replacing mailbox
- Landscaping
- Roofing shingles

Refer to the Trustees page of the Seven Pines website (www.7-pines.com) to learn how to submit requests for Architectural Change approval. The full set of Trustee Policies, as well as the subdivision trust agreement and indenture of restrictions may also be found there.

St. Louis County ordinances may require separate County approval or permits for some projects. Trustee approval is not the same as County approval, and County approval is not the same as Trustee approval. Some improvements may require both. It is the homeowner's responsibility to comply with all applicable subdivision and County rules and regulations. If in doubt, please reach out to the Trustees at trustees@7-pines.com.
